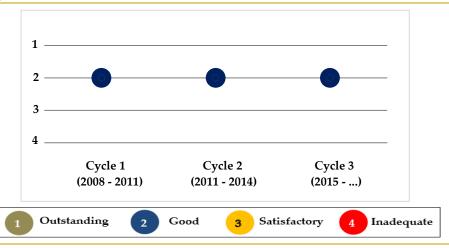

Introduction

The Directorate of Government Schools Reviews (DGS), which is a part of the Education and Training Quality Authority (BQA), conducted this review over three days by a team of seven reviewers. During the review, reviewers observed lessons and other activities, scrutinised students' written works and analysed the school's performance data and other documents. They spoke to the staff, students and parents. This report summarises their findings and recommendations.

Judgement justifications

- The school's overall effectiveness. academic achievement and teaching and learning are the same good level as in the previous review. However, students' personal development and management leadership, governance have regressed from 'Outstanding' to 'Good'. The aspect of support and guidance has retrograded from 'Outstanding' to 'Satisfactory'. This has been affected by some aspects related to students' safety and security, such as leaking water tanks that have affected WC ceilings and the school building.
- Advisory guidance and personal support programmes provided to

- students are effective, especially those related to behavioural values. Students receive sensitive care when they face problems, resulting students and parents' satisfaction with the school's provision.
- Students show self-confidence and ability to assume leadership roles and take responsibility. They also show enthusiasm and motivation towards participating in the school life.
- Most teachers effectively apply teaching and learning strategies, especially in the good and outstanding lessons, which account for over threequarters of the lessons observed, particularly in class teaching. They

employ various motivational and encouragement techniques and assessment methods that enable students to achieve high performance levels in most core subjects, except in English where their levels vary especially in Cycle 1. Some lessons are

- also affected by time management and in utilising assessment results to support low achievers.
- Community partnership with parents and local community institutions are diverse, with a substantial role in enriching the students' experiences.

Main positive features

- The effectiveness of behavioural values programmes that enhance students' personal development and the care provided to them when they face problems.
- The various and effective encouragement techniques that motivate students to actively participate in lessons.
- Students' active and enthusiastic contribution to school life and their evident self-confidence.
- The fruitful communication with the local community; enhancing students' expertise and developing their personalities.

Recommendations

- Take the necessary measures and actions to address the leakage in the water tanks as soon as possible to prevent any damage that might affect the bathrooms' ceilings and the school building in general, and to ensure students' safety and security.
- Further monitor of the impact of professional development programmes, in order to apply effective teaching and learning strategies, focusing on:
 - developing students' basic skills in English
 - benefiting from the effective assessment techniques to support low achievers and assist them during lessons
 - optimal investment in learning time to make lessons more productive.
- Address the shortage in human resources represented by a senior teacher of mathematics, and in school facilities such as the bathrooms, to suit the number of students and staff.

Judgement justifications

 The leadership is aware of the school's situation, points of strength and areas for development and understands the improvement priorities. This is attributed to applying continuous and accurate self-evaluation of the school's

- situation and using of results in developing the annual plan, which is systematically implemented and monitored.
- The school has introduced several improvements, including shared teamwork, delegation of authority, involving parents more often in the various activities, promoting students' personal aspects and developing their talents.
- The school faces a number of challenges that negatively affect its performance. These include:
 - insufficient capacity of some facilities, such as the computer lab and bathrooms

- the diversity of social cases, , severe health issues and few disabled students
- the lack of a senior teacher of mathematics
- the old school building and lack of shaded areas in general, while the gym is shared with another school.
- The school's evaluations provided in the self-evaluation form (SEF), which are viewed as outstanding in all aspects, are inconsistent with the review team's judgments, though are consistent in some criteria.
